And without suffering, there's no resurrection. For me, the love of our Lord transcends every social class and condition the way it did for Cornelia. ### A Call to the Associates Gathering at the SHCJ Chapter Meeting

"I am a person of actions, not words" is a comment from several associates about our meeting during the SHCJ Chapter in June.

Like Cornelia, associates are called to action for specific ministries to oppressed and suffering persons (to the most vulnerable). Action is the Spirit at work, whether the action is prayer, meditation, service in particular ministries or quiet living of faith with our workmates, neighbors and family.

Associates are gathering during the SHCJ Chapter June 27 – 29, 2003 in Philadelphia. We will share and pray together, report to the Chapter and seek the Holy Spirit to sustain and quicken us in our calling as associates. The charism of Cornelia bonds us in our inner being and in our actions. In June we come together to probe, to discover and to reflect on the deeper movement of the charism within. We will discern together the next step in our common life as associates.

### Cornelian Ministries Appoints First Executive Director

The Board of Directors of Cornelian Ministries, Inc. is pleased to announce the appointment of Suzanne P. O'Grady, MSS, as its first Executive Director. Ms. O'Grady will begin her duties on May 1, 2003.

Suzanne O'Grady began her career as a member, and later, Area Director of the Jesuit Volunteer Corps, coordinating the domestic volunteer program in Philadelphia, New York City and Camden. She worked as a Policy Advocate Social Worker for the Support Center for Child Advocates and has most recently been the Philadelphia Catholic Social Services Administrator for Foster Care, Services to Children in their Own Homes (SCOH) and Family Preservation.

Ms. O'Grady commented, "As a lay woman, it is exciting to serve as a catalyst in providing opportunities for volunteers to put their faith into action while they offer much needed assistance and energy to worthwhile ministries. I am so grateful for this opportunity."

Cornelian Ministries is a new non-profit corporation intended to organize volunteers in support of fledgling ministries and to educate and inspire volunteers and others in the spirit and charism of Cornelia Connelly, founder of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus, a Roman Catholic order of nuns headquartered in Rome and Drexel Hill, PA. Cornelian Ministries' offices are located in St. Joseph's Hall, Rosemont College, Rosemont, Pennsylvania 19010.
