

Pilgrimage to Cornelia's England

On October 10th 16 pilgrims gathered from their various start points and arrived in London, U.K. Our goal was to see some of the locations and neighborhoods of London, Mayfield, and Oxford that Cornelia and many SHCJ Sisters would have lived in. Many places looked different in from what our predecessors would have known. The buildings in London reflected the impact of WWII, the Mayfield Chapel has been remodeled since Cornelia's time. However, none of these differences took away from our goal. The most amazing day was on October 13th, when we shared in the celebration of the Society's foundation day with a number of the students at Mayfield School in the Chapel. After lunch, our group, joined by Sister Angela O'Connor and Sister Jenny Bullen, stood around Cornelia's tomb and shared our prayers and intentions for her intercession.

The trip itself was a transformative experience for me. My initial intention was to act as historian, sharing the knowledge that I've acquired in my time as archivist. I had already seen many of the places but by the end of the trip I felt like a true pilgrim. I had walked the steps along with everyone else, and along with Cornelia Connelly and every other Holy Child Sister who had travelled to and lived in these places. Together we searched for God and his pres-

ence in Cornelia. We saw glimpses of what Cornelia's feelings and understandings must have been in a foreign country where her faith was not the accepted norm. I learned so much about my fellow pilgrims in this shared experience and I am so thankful for this experience of a lifetime.

Meet one of our new Associates, Kathy Enos

Meet the Associates: Kathy Enos

Kathy Enos is a member of St. Luke parish in Mint

Hill, North Carolina. On January 6, 2023, she participated in her first Associate commitment ceremony at a home mass with the Mint Hill Associates. Kathy and Ann Helms, who also made her commitment promise on the Epiphany, were mentored by Bob McHugh along their journey to becoming Associates. Let us hear in Kathy's own words about her faith journey and what led her to Cornelia and the Associate way of life.

Linda: Tell us a little about yourself. Where are you from?

Kathy: My hometown is Cresson, PA, where my 94-year-old mother still resides in the home I grew up in. I have 5 siblings and

my twin sister and I are the youngest. I currently live in Rock Hill, SC. My daughter and son-in-law, Courtney and Tré, live in Greenville, NC, with my grandsons, Elijah (9) and Caleb (7). I am an Administrative Assistant and have worked in this role for my current employer for over 43 years.

Linda: Will you share your faith story with us?

Kathy: I was raised Greek Catholic and confirmed at baptism when I was an infant. Our catechism classes ended at 8th grade. As an adult, I always attended weekly Mass but truly became more involved with ministry after joining St. Luke Church in 1996. I have been involved in the HOPE (Helping Other People Endure) Ministry for over 24 years and have been a coordinator for 21 years. I have met many wonder-

ful parishioners by visiting them when sick. Sort of like cold calling–stopping in their hospital room or rehab to say hello. Never knowing them until that

moment but leaving with the feeling I had known them forever. Those friendships continue to this day.

Linda: How did you come to know the Society of the Holy Child Jesus?

Kathy: I was aware of the Society of the Holy Child Jesus when Sister Veronica Grover was at St. Luke. Although I did not know much about the Society, I knew several parishioners who were involved in it. I was introduced to the Society in 2022 and became a member in 2023.

Linda: What attracted you to become an Associate?

Kathy: During the initial training, I wasn't sure I was a good fit. But as I learned more about the Society, I felt being an Associate would be a wonderful extension of my HOPE Ministry in that I could continue to help other people endure in other circumstances.

Linda: How has being an Associate affected your everyday life?

Kathy: I have become more aware and compassionate of the unjust social issues that plague America and the world. I am more caring about different experiences other people have endured and recognizing their situations are not always the fault of

Poetry Off the Shelf

The Story Wheel


I leave you to your ceremony of grieving Which is also of celebration Given when an honored humble one Leaves behind a trail of happiness in the dark of human tribulation. None of us is above the other *In this story of forever.* Though we follow that red road home, one behind another. There is a light breaking through the storm And it is Buffalo hunting weather. There you can see your mother She is busy as she was ever She holds up a new jingle dress, for her youngest beloved daughter. And for her special son, a set of finely beaded gear, All for that welcome home dance. The most favorite of all when everyone finds their way back together to dance eat and celebrate. And tell story after story of how they fought and played in the story wheel and how no one was ever really lost at all.

A deep spiritual energy animates "The Story Wheel." Joy Harjo, whose "Eagle Poem" was featured in our winter 2020 newsletter, draws on her own traditions to describe universal human experiences. As the first Native American to serve as US Poet Laureate (2019-2022), Harjo's gift lies in her ability to use specific cultural details to capture what is meaningful to all of us, found in what scholar of religion Joseph Campbell calls "the mythos."

Only the very first word of this poem includes the poet as the narrator, pointing the way for us: "I leave you to your ceremony..." The conjunction of opposites in the opening five lines comprises a single sentence and sets the tone of mythic resonance. Grieving is also celebration, and happiness is present in the midst of tribulation. The loved one is both honored and humble. We are attending to a "story of forever" and the generations follow each other home eternally, "one behind another" and yet "None...above the other." Harjo has placed us squarely in the heart of the human journey, life and death, and has prepared us for what comes next.

Now when we move on to "Buffalo hunting weather," with "light breaking through the storm," we can be fully present: "There you can see your mother." This scene, I believe, is depicting both an event in real time and a memory: "She is as busy as she was ever..." The vivid imagery – "a new jingle dress," "a set of finely beaded gear" - delights us and grounds us in the joy of a festive day. However, as the poem proceeds, the time frame shifts to include the eternal. We begin to realize that Harjo has given us a vision of a mother who has passed on and become an ancestor. The "welcome home dance" is enacted here on earth and also eternally. To believe in the communion of saints is to understand what this "most favorite of all" celebration is really about, "when everyone finds their way back together."
